GENESIS 3: THE ORIGIN OF SIN IN HUMANITY

We have very little definitive information concerning the actual beginning of sin in creation (for we know that it ultimately began with the fall of Satan). We do know that the ultimate cause of sin, as related to humanity, lies in God's choice to make us free creatures capable of communion with God. The gift of liberty is also a terrible weight. We can choose hell, destruction, and separation from God – or all that is good. God does allow people to make such choices. To be a human being is an awesome responsibility, for we have the frightful gift and responsibility of freedom. Though we cannot fully explain why sin began, we are told how it began among humans. That is recorded in Genesis 3, an important chapter in human history and an important chapter for understanding sin. Several factors in this chapter call for some attention.

Why did God give them the restriction? Why did He even create such a tree if He did not want them to partake of it?
